As a consequence, plaintiffs' lawyers can expect a number of legislative changes effecting injured workers.

The state's Workcover Scheme has been particularly criticised by plaintiffs' lawyers for December 1992 amendments that abolished common law rights and retrospectively reduced a large number of impairment benefits. The Liberal Opposition has promised to substantially alter the scheme, with details of specific changes yet to be announced.

APLA in South Australia is confident that with concerted effort by its local membership, the concerns and rights of injured workers will be persuasively put to South Australian legislators, both before and after 11th December.
