# Sir Harry Holdsworth Rawson

(27 May 1902 – 27 May 1909)

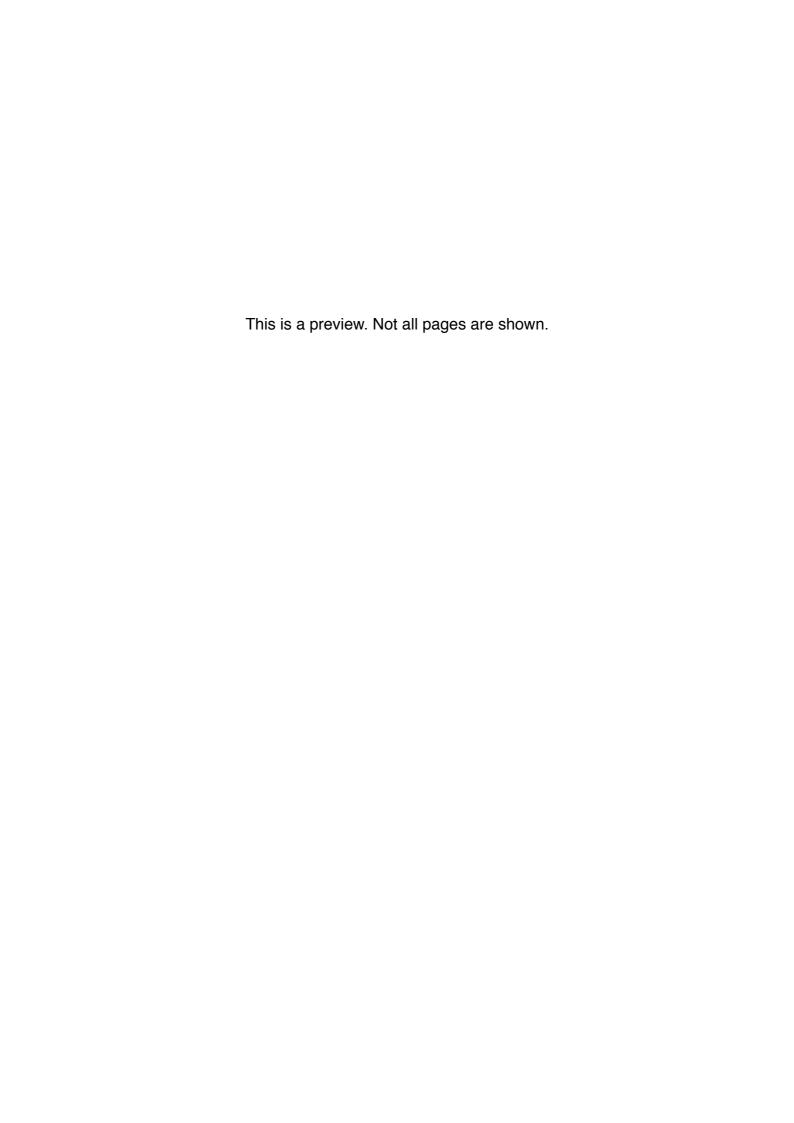

## Naval hero

Descended from a long line of Rawsons settled in Yorkshire since Saxon times, Harry Holdsworth was born on Guy Fawkes Day, 5 November 1843, at Upper Islington, Liverpool, England, second son and third of seven children¹ of Christopher Rawson, merchant of Rock Ferry, Cheshire, and his wife Ellen Frances, née Wright. His father later became a Magistrate in Surrey² and sent Harry to a dame's school at Reading. Educated at Marlborough College (from February 1854 to December 1855) and Eastman's Naval Academy at Southsea, Harry joined the Royal Navy as a cadet on 9 April 1857 and in June sailed for Hong Kong in HMS *Princess Charlotte*.

On arrival Rawson transferred to the flagship HMS *Calcutta* and saw active service during the second China War (1857-60). He was present in *Calcutta*'s launch at the capture (1858) of the Taku forts at the mouth of the Peiho River by the British and French fleets. While his ship was refitting in Hong Kong the officers amused themselves with amateur theatricals. Rawson was a born actor and "made a wonderfully good girl".<sup>3</sup> According to the *China Mail* the "half-coaxing, half-threatening manner of this 'Little Treasure' was excellently rendered by Mr Rawson, naval cadet, who took the part".<sup>4</sup> In March 1859 *Calcutta* sailed for England; during the voyage Rawson was promoted to Midshipman. When he reached England he did not see his parents, as his father was Captain and District Paymaster in Lower Canada.

Transferred to the *Encounter*, an old and leaky ship, Harry Rawson returned to the China Station. As ADC to Captain Dew he accompanied the Army that marched on Peking (Beijing) and burned the Summer Palace. The Chinese Government surrendered and the Treaty of Tientsin was signed on 24 October 1860. On a brief visit to Shanghai he jumped



relatives placed a stained glass window depicting Christ's Entry into Jerusalem in the chapel at the Royal Naval College at Greenwich; the window was damaged in World War II and the plaque transferred to the Memorial Chapel upstairs. <sup>108</sup> The words of William Wordsworth sum up Rawson's life:

This is the happy warrior – this is he Whom every man in arms should wish to be. 109
